RE: Lagoon Decommissioning Site Visit

Dear Mr. Houk:

On October 6, 2015 Harvey Doty notified me that the South Bend WWTP lagoon decommissioning project was complete per the Site Specific Land Application Plan cited in South Bend WWTP's Final Letter of Coverage, dated September 2, 2015. Subsequently, on November 25th, Rick Mraz and I travelled to South Bend to observe a high tidal event. Due to the high tide, we observed the site from across the river on the 600 block of 1st Street. This allowed us to observe whether the site work and grading appeared to have been completed to the degree necessary for estuarine re-establishment. Our initial impression is that the site has been graded to an elevation that will allow estuarine wetlands re-establishment.

We intend to visit the site again in late spring of 2016 to observe the progress of vegetation establishment and tidal effects. Per Appendix N of the Application packet, the city will be responsible to monitor and manage the site for three years following decommissioning to prevent noxious weeds from establishing. This should not be a problem if the grading on the site was completed properly; very few plant species can tolerate elevated salinity. Also, as stated in the Final Letter of Coverage, the city will be responsible to provide annual summaries of communication, including photographs and an estimate of non-invasive plant establishment onsite.
