Name of proposal: City of Westport Shoreline Master Program (SMP) Periodic Update

Proponent: City of Westport

Description of proposal: Westport is conducting a periodic review and updating its Shoreline Master Program (SMP) to comply with State law and updated regulations (RCW 90.58 and WAC 173-26 and WAC 173-27). The State's Shoreline Management Act (RCW 90.58) requires each SMP to be reviewed and revised, if needed, on an eight-year schedule established by the Legislature.

Location of proposal, including street address, if any: The SMP applies city-wide, and regulates development in the Shoreline Jurisdiction.

Lead agency: City of Westport

The lead agency for this proposal has determined that it does not have a probable significant adverse impact on the environment. An environmental impact statement (EIS) is not required under RCW 43.21C.030 (2)(c). This decision was made after review of a completed environmental checklist and other information on file with the lead agency. This information is available to the public on request.

This DNS is issued under WAC 197-11-340(2); the lead agency will not act on this proposal for 14 days from the date below. **Comments must be submitted by April 3, 2023.**
