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TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

I am Ronald H. Averill, from Centralia, and I am an applicant for one of the Chehalis River Basin Flood Authority Advisory Board positions for the Office of Chehalis Basin, Washington Department of Ecology. My qualifications are provided below.

Expertise necessary to provide strong oversight for implementation of the Chehalis Basin Strategy:

- As a County Commissioner for Lewis County, in 2008, I testified before the Legislature, and worked with Legislators and Governor Gregoire's staff to write the legislation which established the Chehalis River Basin Flood Authority (FA), and provided \$50 Million in Capital Budget funding for the 2008-2009 biennium.
- Subsequently, I worked with the three base counties in the Chehalis Basin (Grays Harbor, Lewis, and Thurston); the Cities of Aberdeen, Montesano, Oakville, Centralia, and Chehalis; the Towns of Bucoda and Pe Ell; and the Confederated Tribes of the Chehalis Reservation (Chehalis Tribe) to fashion an Interlocal Agreement under which the jurisdictions agreed to work with each other to develop means to mitigate against persistent flooding in the Chehalis Basin.
- I chaired the FA for the first three years of its existence. Initially, the FA worked with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (the Corps) on an existing project under the Federal Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) to improve the TransAlta Dam on the Skookumchuck River and improve and build 13 miles of levees around Centralia and Chehalis. In those days, the FA was primarily oriented to flood mitigation and habitat restoration was Under the Chehalis Partnership, established in the mid-90's under Washington's Salmon Recovery Act.
- The Corps WRDA project proceeded on a snail's pace, and eventually an alternate project to build a dam south of Pe Ell on the mainstem of the Chehalis River with a capacity of 80,000 acre feet gained momentum. However, not without opposition primarily due to concerns about potential damage to aquatic species. Thus, the FA funded consultant studies on both the feasibility of constructing a dam and studies on aquatic species in the Chehalis Basin.
- It was further recognized that if capital facilities were constructed for flood mitigation, then it
 would be necessary to have a three-county flood or flood-zone district to provide for operations
 and maintenance. Since Flood Districts are single county municipal corporations under the
 RCW, we worked with the Legislature pursuing legislation to establish a three-county Chehalis
 Flood District.
- In 2011, strong opposition to the dam and internal differences within the FA about pursuing flood mitigation or habitat restoration as a primary course resulted in the Chehalis Tribe withdrawing from the FA and leaving the FA severely fractured. At that point, Governor Gregoire's Office stepped in, helped the parties reconcile, and created a new Governor Level Work Group (GWG) committed to recommend a Chehalis Basin Strategy.

- The GWG, which included the Chehalis Tribe, developed a strategy to study the feasibility of a Water Retention Facility for flood mitigation, and a major effort to improve aquatic species restoration. The GWG became the prime mover on the major project feasibility studies and the Programmatic Environmental Impact Statement. The FA, on the other hand was the prime mover on local small flood mitigation projects, home elevations, venting, farm pads, and local flood management planning.
- As a County Commissioner, I attended all the meetings of the Flood Authority, Open Houses on FA projects and studies, and all the GWG forums on the strategy. My term as a County Commissioner ended in 2012, and since then I have represented the City of Centralia on the FA. There is no one who has been on the FA longer than myself, or is more familiar with its history.

Extensive Knowledge of Local Government Process and Functions:

- I hold both a Bachelor's and Master's degree in government, and I was a Professor of Political Science at the college and university level for over 20 years. I have worked in government at the federal, state and local level.
- I served on County Level Committees for land use planning prior to my election as a County Commissioner. As a County Commissioner, I served on the FA and the Washington Association of Counties Legislative Committee and the Washington Farm Bureau Legislative Committee. I also served on numerous boards, councils, commissions, and committees dealing with local government process and functions.
- Since I retired, I continue to represent the City of Centralia on the FA, and I have served on and chaired the FA Small Projects Committee. I also serve on, and presently chair a U.S. Army Recruiting Advisory Board; and, serve on and chair the Washington Emergency Management Council. I serve on many other local boards dealing with local government process and functions.

Understanding of issues relevant to reducing flood damages and restoring aquatic species:

- In the nine years I have served on the FA as chair, member, and small projects chair, I have been
 immersed in every aspect of flood mitigation and restoring aquatic species. I have been
 exposed to the pros and cons of both sides of both issues.
- I have attended the Governor's Indian Affairs Forum on Tribal Sovereignty and I fully understand the cultural commitment the Indian Tribes have for restoring aquatic species.

I believe my experience and work within the FA makes me highly qualified to serve as a FA Board member on the Chehalis Basin Board. I respectfully request your consideration.
