

Unemployment Insurance Claim Center

The Employment Security administers Washington's unemployment insurance system, which helps keep our state's economic engine moving by replacing a small portion of lost wages to laid-off workers. In 2014, ESD paid more than \$1.1 billion in UI benefits to about 250,000 individuals to assist them in transition.

The Employment Security Department is an active partner in the WorkSource system, which helps connect employers and job seekers both online and in-person. In 2014, WorkSource staff at 68 centers, affiliates and connection sites statewide recruited and screened candidates for more than 5,275 employers and provided one-on-one job search services to 169,500.



US Department of Labor requires the agency to conduct compliance audit annually.

- What we audit
 - Payroll, accounting and employee time records
 - Business ownership records and licenses
 - Bank records, financial statement, check registers, general ledgers and invoices
 - State and federal tax records, including IRS form 1099s
 - Subcontractor registration numbers, copies of contracts
 - Corporate officer opt-in forms
