a. Work Items:

Work items include study of the existing road system and capital facilities and infrastructure within and serving the City of Roslyn to support the update of the City's Comprehensive Plan. The results of the study will be analyzed to determine road system and capital facility needs to support the City for the next twenty-years, as well as develop a decision making framework for the City to use in developing a work program for pavement and sidewalk preservation or reconstruction to be included in the City's 6-Year TIP.

- The project includes study of existing capital facilities and transportation infrastructure, including: water, sewer, stormwater, buildings, maintenance and storage facilities, equipment, roads, sidewalks, and parks.
- The consultant will prepare an existing conditions report that documents the infrastructure, facilities, and road systems serving the City, and the operations and performance of these systems.
- The consultant will review roadway capacity and operations, infrastructure and facility capacities and limitations, and identify potential local and regional improvements that would address future growth demands or improve current operations.
- The consultant will review parking capacity needs to support local residents, tourism, and recreational parking within the City.
- The consultant will review the existing non-motorized transportation system and identify opportunities to increase safety and provide improved connectivity to local and regional systems.

b. Budget detail:

The proposed budget for the transportation and capital facilities update is \$20,000. In addition to the \$20,000 grant funding, the City is contributing \$13,000 in 2017 local funds to support the overall Comprehensive Plan update, and will contribute additional funds in 2018. The \$13,000 will support the update through the public participation process and inclusion into the updated Comprehensive Plan.

c. Who will perform the work:

The City will contract with a consultant to perform the work. The consultant will include these tasks in the overall Comprehensive Plan update process.

d. Project Readiness:

The City and consultant are prepared to begin the project in August 2017.

e. Timelines for completion:

The project is planned to be completed by the end of 2018, but no later than June 2019, and will run concurrent with the Comprehensive Plan update process.

This project will provide local information that is important for addressing regional needs and preserving and improving economic vitality of Roslyn and the Upper Kittitas County region.

Yes, this proposal implements strategies for meeting goals identified within the regional transportation plan. Because this is a proposal for a city-wide transportation and capital facilities review, all goals are addressed, beginning on Page 7.
Goal 1 - Safety : The planning effort will address pedestrian and bicyclist safety and identify projects necessary to increase safety, such as a safe route to school, sidewalks, and safe crossing locations along SR 903.
Goal 2 – Preservation: The planning effort will address preservation of the existing road system, including an analysis of the current pavement conditions to develop a pavement management system and work plan to be identified within the City's 6-year TIP. The planning effort will also look at infrastructure within the City to ensure the City is well positioned and prepared for future growth.
Goal 3 – Economic Vitality: Roslyn's transportation system provides access to local residents and tourists, who provide vitality to the economy. This planning effort will evaluate the transportation and infrastructure system to ensure it meets the needs of the city's tourism economy into the future, while providing for the access and transit needs of local residents.
Goal 4 – Mobility : The planning effort will identify and address the needs of public transportation within the City of Roslyn, through coordination with local transit and para-transit providers.
Goal 5 – Environment: The planning effort will protect the environment through analysis and

focus on ensuring all residents and visitors have convenient access to multimodal, non-motorized transportation systems. As the natural environment of upper Kittitas County is a primary draw of

Yes, this proposal develops the local Transportation Plan and Capital Facilities Plan and supports the City's Comprehensive Plan update. The update to the Comprehensive Plan is proposed to begin early summer 2017 and be completed in 2018, but no later than June 2019. These funds will allow the city to perform an in depth analysis of their road system, infrastructure, and facilities, and prepare a plan for the next twenty years. The data gathered and resulting information from this process will be used in all elements of the Comprehensive Plan, including land use, housing, parks, economic vitality, utilities, and historic preservation.

Yes, State Route 903 passes through Roslyn and is the only route to Roslyn and the Salmon la Sac area beyond. SR 903 is part of the regional transportation system and is an integral part of Roslyn's motorized and non-motorized transportation system. The proposed planning effort will address:
• Pedestrian and vehicular safety through the City;

- The efficiency and effectiveness of the road system as it relates to movement of local residents and the tourists who pass through year-round; and
- The preservation of the local road system which supports SR 903.

Yes, the proposed project will address multimodal travel options, primarily for pedestrians and for both local residents and tourists. As a rural city, travel delays and connections are not as great a concern, but as a city connected to the mountains and regional trail systems, multimodal opportunities are very important to local residents and the visitors that come year-round. The City is a hub of multimodal opportunities, from hiking to biking to snowmobiling, and ensuring a smooth connection from one to the other as well as varied opportunities is very important. 9. Does this proposal demonstrate a cost-effective manner to achieve a viable solution to a potential or recognized problem? Yes □ No If yes, explain. Yes, many pieces of Roslyn's infrastructure and have been identified as being in need of repair or replacement. For example, portions of South 2nd Street, Roslyn's secondary north-south access, have a pavement condition rating of 44. These funds will help the City identify potential solutions to current and future capacity and operations limitations and develop a cost effective work plan for making the needed improvements. 10. First tier projects fulfill transportation planning needs of regional significance. Second tier projects fulfill planning needs of sub-regional and local significance and used to provide examples to assist other member agencies in their planning efforts. Completion of regional and/or local planning studies fulfills significant needs to improve the sustainability of the QUADCO regions economic vitality. Projects will include possible solutions to issues of safety, preservation, economic vitality, mobility, environment, and stewardship (not necessarily in that order) and generally include:

- a. Collection of data/information and studies specific to regional corridors.
- Studies specific to regional and local major market routes
- c. Transportation issues affecting larger geographic scales.
- d. Work promoted by a combined group of member agencies and interested parties.
- e. Work that compliments other planning and strategy development work in the region.
- f. Projects being advanced and promoted by Member Agencies, WSDOT and other agencies.

SUBCONTRACTING & EQUIPMENT PURCHASING REQUIREMENTS

ATTENTION: All applicants must comply with the WSDOT/MPO/RTPO Agreement, GCA 1769, Section 12 when subcontracting or purchasing equipment. For your reference, the applicable sections are attached. The complete agreement is available upon request.

Subcontracting and Equipment

- 12.1 The services of the MPO/RTPO are to be directed by a Project Manager. The MPO/RTPO shall not assign, sublet, or transfer any of the work provided for under this Agreement without prior written approval from the STATE, and the STATE shall review and approve the MPO/RTPO's consultant agreement prior to execution. The MPO/RTPO shall comply with all current federal and state laws and regulations governing the selection and employment of consultants. The STATE reserves the right to appoint a representative to serve on the Consultant Selection Committee. Subcontracts for consultant services must contain all the required provisions to the extent applicable of Sections 3, 5, 8, 9, 13 through 15, and 19 through 22 of this Agreement.
- 12.2 Any equipment to be purchased under this Agreement shall be listed in the scope of work. All equipment must be purchased, managed, and disposed of in accordance with all current federal and state laws and regulations and the nondiscrimination provisions of Section18 of this Agreement. The procurement of all equipment must be used for the sole purpose of urban and regional transportation planning activities. Any equipment on hand at the completion of the work shall become the property of the STATE.

The Kittitas County Parks and Recreation District supports the City of Roslyn's application to QUADCO for a UPWP Transportation Planning Grant to update the City's Transportation Plan and Capital Facilities Plan. A comprehensive update to the City's Transportation Plan and Capital Facilities Plan will benefit and complement our Towns to Teanaway Corridor master planning project.

The Parks and Recreation District is beginning a planning process to develop a master plan for the Towns to Teanaway Corridor. This trail corridor stretches from Roslyn and Cle Elum to the Teanaway through land in preservation or public ownership. The overall trail system extends from Leavenworth to Roslyn and Cle Elum to North Bend and beyond. Our trail system depends on the City's transportation and infrastructure systems to support visitors who come to Roslyn to use the trail system.
