Welcome, Introductions

Chair Vickie Raines called the meeting to order at 9:04 a.m. and welcomed the Board, staff, and audience.

2021-23 Budget Status and Spending

OCB Director Andrea McNamara Doyle provided the Board with an overview of a list of funding requests seeking currently available, unobligated funds, including recommendations for specific fund sources (e.g., 2021-23 reserved funds, unobligated 2019-21 funds). Ten funding requests have been identified, totaling \$13.92 million.

Key comments and discussion topics included:

- Board members requested OCB staff provide a more detailed funding table that summarizes the
 overall breakdown of projects funded for aquatic species restoration, flood damage reduction,
 and integrated projects that could be used for outreach with the legislature and key
 stakeholders.
- Board members requested that the ASRP Steering Committee review and provide feedback on the utility of the proposed experimental Skookumchuck River Chinook salmon study.

BOARD DECISION: Board approved the following recommendations by consensus:

- Board released the \$8.53 million in reserved 2021-2023 aquatic species and habitat funds to be obligated for new ASRP projects and aquatic species studies.
- Board released \$104K for time sensitive Skookumchuck River Chinook study activities, to be funded through unobligated 2019-21 funds.
- Board released the remaining \$7.18 million in reserved 2021-2023 flood damage reduction funds.
- Board prioritized ~\$3.3M in unobligated 2019-21 funds for construction costs associated with the Fry Creek Pump Station, and integrated projects including Haul Road Reach-Scale erosion management design, SR 508 Lewis County erosion management construction project, Stream Gage Master Plan update, and targeted outreach and community engagement with underserved populations.

<u>FOLLOW-UP ACTION</u>: ASRP Steering Committee will return to a future Board meeting to provide feedback on the proposed experimental Skookumchuck River Chinook salmon study.

Aquatic Species Restoration Plan (ASRP)

Celina Abercrombie (WDFW) reminded the Board of the three spring 2022 early action reach site tours that Board members and ASRP Steering Committee members attended. Celina invited Board members and Steering Committee members to provide additional comments on their experience.

Key comments and discussion topics included:

- Board members acknowledged the significant size of the early action reach projects and stressed the importance of identifying future large-scale acquisition projects that can provide significant restoration benefits
- Board members voiced their appreciation for the time and effort required to identify and implement early action reach projects
- WDFW staff reminded the Board that dedicated funding for ongoing operation, maintenance, and stewardship is a key part of the long-term success of early action reach projects

Local Actions Non-Dam Alternative (LAND)

Glen Connelly (LAND Steering Group Co-Chair) provided an overview of the June LAND Steering Group (SG) meeting, including a recap of the discussion related to addressing residential and commercial flood impacts through a continuum approach for flood-safe structures. The continuum approach would include actions ranging from assistance with flood insurance to relocation efforts. Discussions also included draft LAND guiding principles, such as the idea of developing short, medium, and long-term recommendations which could potentially be used as criteria to inform future analysis.

Alex Dupey (MIG) provided Board members an overview of the LAND framework elements derived from the May 2022 Values Planning Workshop. These elements are being used to guide development and

analysis for the LAND Alternative and will continue to be refined with LAND Steering Group input, community surveys, and stakeholder input.

Key comments and discussion topics included:

- Board members are interested in whether the LAND process schedule will be adjusted given the
 potential delay in finalizing the SEPA and NEPA EISs due to the proposed mitigation alignment.
- Board members were reminded that MIG is under contract until the end of the calendar year,
 but staff anticipate work will continue at least into Q1 of 2023.

<u>FOLLOW-UP ACTION</u>: MIG will return to a future Board meeting with a refined outline of the LAND framework.

Chehalis River Basin Flood Control Zone District

Jim Kramer introduced Erik Martin (Lewis County), Matt Dillin (Lewis County), Mike Witter (HDR), Michael Kasch (HDR), and Scott Wells (Portland State University) who provided the Board with an update on the work the FCZD has done to fulfill their commitment to clarify questions related to concerns identified in the draft SEPA and NEPA EISs on wetlands, fish species and habitats, water, wildlife species and habitats.

The FCZD noted the following commitments related to wetlands, fish species and habitats, water, wildlife species and habitats:

- Minimize disturbance and leave existing vegetation
- Active Monitoring: Monitor vegetation survivability
- Active Management: Replace dead non flood tolerant species

The FCZD also discussed and clarified some misconceptions about their revised draft vegetation management plan. The major finding of that analysis is that there could be a 40 to 85% reduction in temperature impacts compared to what was originally identified in the Draft SEPA EIS.
