Trust Water Rights Program

RCW 90.42.010 (1991):

"...develop and test a means to facilitate the voluntary_transfer of water rights... to provide water for presently unmet needs and emerging needs."




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Ecology's role

Ecology may hold water rights in trust in different ways to preserve them for existing and future needs

Ecology has <u>sole</u> authority to hold water rights in trust.





Creating a trust water right:

- Water right holder conveys a right to Ecology
- Ecology accepts the right into trust (held in trust)

Water right held in trust:

- Considered "exercised";
 exempt from relinquishment
- Retains original priority date
- Cannot impair other water rights or the public interest



Different ways Ecology acquires water rights

Donations – temporary or permanent

Leases and purchases

Other means - water banking



Types of Trust Water Rights Donations

Ecology is shall accept water rights donated into trust

- For instream flow and groundwater preservation
- Exempt from relinquishment
- Temporary or permanent

The trust program "parking lot"





Types of Trust Water Rights Lease/Purchase

Ecology is authorized to pay for water rights:

- Generally requires extent and validity review
- May be used for instream or out-of-stream uses





Types of Trust Water Rights Water Banks

What is a water bank?


 A mechanism for the voluntary transfer of water to provide water for current and future water needs.

A water bank requires:

- An executed water banking agreement that defines the roles and responsibilities for operating the bank
- A mitigating water right conveyed to Ecology by deed

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Water Resources Program considers establishing water bank




Existing water right

Evaluate validity of right

Decision:

Change purpose of use to "Instream Flow for Mitigation"





Current water banking activities

- Master Water Banking Agreements
 - Stevens County
 - Okanogan County
 - Chelan County
 - Kittitas County
 - Yakima County
- Increased flexibility of existing banks
 - Orville Tonasket Irrigation District
 - Yakima Basin water banks

Prioritizing Water Banks

- Criteria outlined in Policy 1010
 - No impairment to existing rights nor the public interest
 - Administrative capacity
 - Alignment with Water Resources Program priorities

Climate Change and Population Growth









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CHELAN COUNTY WATER BANK

Envisioning Chelan County Reserve Accounting

- Created in 2021
- Primarily small domestic focused
- Larger mitigation options under consideration long-term



OTID WATER BANK



- Created by fallowed land, conservation, and crop change
- Initial bank seeding of ~5,500 acre-feet of CU
- Multi-purpose bank
- Biggest customer to-date is Chelan Public Utility District, long-term agreement for 4,000 acre-feet

GRANT COUNTY WATER BANK GRANT

Grant Count is beginning a strategic planning effort on water banking in 2025-2026 funded by WaterSmart including:

- Conducting outreach / partnership building
- Evaluating ways water banking may fill gaps in demand
- Determining who, how, and where a bank might operate
- Summarizing findings in a strategic plan
