

- Became an AmeriCorps Program in 1994
- Must be 18-25 (exceptions for disability status, military veterans, military reservists, and active duty dependents)
- Continuation of legacy of the Civilian Conservation Corps
- Provides field experience, networking opportunities, training and hands on experience
- Address natural resource, recreational assets, and disaster services
- 53 Full-time year around crews

- March April 2014: Oso landslide and flood response




