- 9:15 Presentation of findings from SAM Mobile business stormwater source control and coordination project (Alison Schweitzer, King County and James Packman, Herrera Environmental Consultants)
 - Project website: Mobile business stormwater source control and coordination

- This SAM study focused on creating and advancing resources for municipal stormwater permittees to address stormwater source control activities related to mobile businesses. Some mobile businesses have unique challenges related to pollution prevention due to their mobile nature and working at dispersed sites in multiple jurisdictions. The goal of the study is to provide analysis, tools, and resources to help permittees identify, inspect, and coordinate municipal source control activities.

9:45 PRO-C and SAM Project Updates (Todd Hunsdorfer, PRO-C Chair)

- PRO-C met January 22, with no changes to membership, to discuss transition plans before Brandi's departure.
 - Chelsea Morris will be managing Brandi's 5 active contracts. Four are scheduled to be end in 2024.
 - Leslie Connelly will manage fiscal responsibilities in the interim.
 - Chelsea is working on the next SAM Booklet, the culmination of the 2019-2024 permit cycle studies.
- Updates on new projects
 - Drafting statements of work for 4 projects: Street Sweeping Loading Evaluation,
 Full Scale Testing of HPBSM, CEC monitoring, and Permeable Pavement.
- Updates from Effectiveness Studies and Source ID projects
 - Today we heard from the Mobile business projects, in the future we'll hear about roadside ditch maintenance, infiltration performance at our oldest bioretention facilities, and the effectiveness of small urban trees in mitigating stormwater runoff.
 - WSU's Business Source Control Inspection and Training contract was completed and closed returning \$5587.35 to SAM's account.
 - Other SAM projects also have notable project scope and schedule changes.
- Updates from Receiving Water Studies
 - WDFW initiated their fifth monitoring survey with SAM by deploying caged mussels at 33 sites. They are expected to present findings from their fourth survey in May. <u>Puget Sound nearshore project website.</u>
 - Clark County completed a status report of Lower Columbia Urban Streams for Water Year 2022. We are working with them to extend their contract to continue monitoring into the next permit cycle. <u>Lower Columbia urban streams project</u> <u>website.</u>

PSEMP

- PSEMP Strategic Planning: We are continuing to work on updating the strategic plan. In the January Steering Committee meeting, there was more discussion and feedback on the draft goals for PSEMP in the next 4 years. Between January to March, the strategic actions will be developed and discussed at the March Steering Committee meeting.
- Public Comment Opportunity Puget Sound Salmon Recovery Plan Addendum: The public comment period is open from Jan. 8 until Feb. 21. The Puget Sound community has an opportunity to <u>provide feedback on the Puget Sound Salmon</u> <u>Recovery Plan Addendum through an online platform</u> and by submitting letters. Letters can be sent via email to Ashley Bagley at <u>ashley.bagley@psp.wa.gov</u>, salmon policy advisor at the Puget Sound Partnership.

- WA Department of Ecology
 - o 6PPD
 - Soliciting for new best management practices (BMP) effectiveness studies: Ecology has over \$3 million available for new 6PPD BMP effectiveness studies through three funding opportunities: 6PPD Interagency Agreements (IAAs), 6PPD Request for Proposals (RFP), and the Stormwater Strategic Initiative Lead (SIL) RFP.
 - We are actively accepting pitches for IAAs. If you are a member of a public organization, including Tribal Nations, government agencies, and public universities, and have a 6PPD project idea, please reach out to madison.bristol@ecy.wa.gov to start the IAA process.
 - The 6PPD RFP and the SIL RFP will be published in early 2024. We will share more about these opportunities on <u>our project</u> webpage and via the SWG listserv in February 2024.

■ Manchester Environmental Lab (MEL): MEL has been officially accredited for 6PPD-quinone water samples. MEL is the first lab in the state to be accredited for 6PPD-q. The EPA is also planning on releasing a draft laboratory method in the near future.

■ 6PPD Action Plan

- The Washington State Departments of Ecology and Health are developing a 6PPD Action Plan. The 6PPD Action Plan will identify and consider actions that could be taken to mitigate current impacts from 6PPD-quinone and phase out 6PPD use in the future. Currently, the Action Plan is in Phase 1, which focuses on research needs, data gaps, and developing recommendations for WA state agency budget requests.
- The 6PPD Action Plan Advisory Committee held its first kick-off meeting on January 24, 2024. The Advisory Committee is open to more members and listeners. If you would like to receive an invite, please reach out to madison.bristol@ecy.wa.gov.
- Contracting status of SAM Full Proposal 1 Street Sweeping Synthesis: After being approved for funding at the last SWG meeting, Ecology has proceeded with developing the scope of work (SOW) for FP1. PRO-C is in the process of reviewing this SOW. This proposal will be fully funded using Ecology's 6PPD funding.
- Stormwater Strategic Initiative Lead (SIL): The SIL currently has RFPs open for Climate Resiliency in Stormwater Management and Increasing Stormwater Parks in Puget Sound. - The co-chairs are actively developing the 2024-2025 SWG Work Plan, which will
 define key goals, deliverables, and timelines for the SWG until December 2025.
- Notable changes from the last work plan:
 - PSEMP Liaison: Co-chairs will attend the PSEMP meetings.
 - **Discuss:** Do SWG members prefer the co-chairs attending PSEMP work group meetings or having a separate liaison?
 - Subgroup inclusion in the work plan: Historically, subgroup work plans were included as a part of the SWG work plan. We also have an option to develop subgroup work plans separately in collaboration with the SWG.

11:40 Debrief the SWG 6PPD Subgroup Meeting (Eli Mackiewicz, 6PPD Subgroup Co-Chair)

- The last meeting was on December 13, 2023. View these <u>meeting notes</u> for more details.
- At this meeting, Curtis Hinman on behalf of King County gave <u>a presentation</u> on the preliminary results of King County's "Testing Removal of 6PPD-q and Coho Salmon Lethality by High Performance Bioretention Media Blends" project:
 - Study Design: Column array using a media lab at Western Washington University in Bellingham to test ECY's compost-based bioretention soil media (BSM) and high performance bioretention soil media (HPBSM). Contaminated stormwater from the I-5 Ship Canal Test Facility is ran through the soil mixes. Samples of influent and effluent are tested for concentrations of 6PPD-q, total suspended solids (TSS), conductivity, pH, and additional parameters. The study is also testing acute mortality directly with juvenile coho salmon.
 - Preliminary Results: Influent concentrations for 6PPD-q were between 0.23 0.79 ug/L, all BSM mixes were able to reduce 6PPD-q levels in the effluent to below the LC50 for coho salmon (0.04 0.10 ug/L) aka the concentration at which half of the test population experiences acute mortality. Coho survival significantly increased from only 5% survival in the influent to 100% survival in the effluent. Additional rounds of testing are ongoing and final results are still pending.
