13	COMES NOW the State of Washington, Department of Ecology, through its Director	
14	Laura Watson and its attorney, Matthew Janz, Assistant Attorney General, and submits this	
15	Statement of Facts and Map in the above-entitled Court for the general adjudication of surface	
16	and ground waters of Water Resource Inventory Area 1 (WRIA 1). This Statement of Facts and	
17	Map are filed pursuant to RCW 90.03.110. Attached in support of this Statement of Facts and	
18	Map are a proposed order directing summons, proposed summons, and the declaration of	
19	Ecology employee Leigh Bedell with maps of the subject area and list of defendants.	
20	I. INTRODUCTION	
21	The Department of Ecology is authorized under RCW 90.03 to initiate the determination	
22	of rights to waters of the state upon a petition brought by a planning unit or one or more persons	
23	claiming the right to any waters of the state. See RCW 90.03.110(1). In 2019 and 2020, Ecology	
24	received requests from the Lummi Nation and Nooksack Tribe petitioning the State adjudicate	
25	surface and ground water rights in WRIA 1. Ecology, after extensive assessment, finds that the	
26	general adjudication of the surface and ground waters of WRIA 1 is in the public interest.	

Pursuant to RCW 90.03.110, this Statement of Facts and Map initiates the adjudication of the
 waters of WRIA 1 as described herein.

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a.

II. JURISDICTION AND VENUE

The Superior Court has jurisdiction over this matter under RCW 90.03.

b. WRIA 1 is predominantly located in Whatcom County and also includes some
northern areas of Skagit County. Ecology files this adjudication in the Superior Court of
Whatcom County as the county most convenient to the parties as authorized by RCW 90.03.110.

c. This Court has jurisdiction over all water users in WRIA 1, including the United
States on its own and as trustee for Lummi Nation and Nooksack Tribe. The United States
consents to state jurisdiction in general stream adjudications under the McCarran Amendment,
43 U.S.C. § 666.

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III. PARTIES

a. The Plaintiff is the State of Washington, Department of Ecology, authorized
under RCW 43.21A to manage the water resources of the State of Washington, and including
the authority to initiate the adjudication of water rights in superior court under RCW 90.03.110.

16 b. Defendants will be identified as all parties with a claimed interest in the waters
17 of WRIA 1 and will include:

- i. As required by RCW 90.03.110(1)(a)(i), each person owning real property in the subject area outside the service area of a city, town, or special purpose district, listed in Exhibit C to the Bedell Declaration.
 - ii. As required by RCW 90.03.110(1)(a)(ii), all known persons claiming a right to water within the subject area reflected in the plan map. This includes all persons, and any spouse they may have, owning real property within the place of use of a water right document on file with the Department of Ecology, also listed in Exhibit C to the Bedell Declaration.
 - STATEMENT OF FACTS AND MAP

1	iii. The Lummi Tribe of the Lummi Reservation, known also as Lummi Nation,
2	a federally recognized Indian tribe. The Lummi Nation requested this
3	adjudication of WRIA 1 by petition dated January 29, 2020, claiming treaty
4	rights to water at its usual and accustomed fishing grounds and stations, as
5	well as water for consumptive uses necessary to fulfill other purposes of its
6	reservation. The Lummi Nation may also claim rights to water through its
7	reservation and trust lands, as a property owner, holder of state-issued water
8	rights, or under other legal theories to be determined by the court.
9	iv. The Nooksack Tribe of Indians, a federally recognized Indian tribe requested
10	an adjudication of WRIA 1 by petition dated May 3, 2019, claiming treaty
11	rights to water at its usual and accustomed fishing grounds and stations. The
12	Nooksack Tribe may also claim rights to water through its reservation and
13	trust lands, as a property owner, holder of state-issued water rights, or under
14	other legal theories to be determined by the court.
15	v. The United States of America, as an owner of real property in the subject
16	area, as a claimant of federally reserved rights to water, and as trustee for
17	Lummi Nation and Nooksack Tribe.
18	IV. FACTS
19	Pursuant to RCW 90.03.110(1)(b), Ecology provides this brief statement of facts in
20	relation to the waters of WRIA 1, and the necessity for a determination of the rights to those
21	waters.
22	A. Adjudication Assessment Report to Legislature
23	Prior to filing for the general adjudication of water rights, Ecology is required, in part,
24	to "[r]eport to the appropriate committees of the legislature on the estimated budget needs."
25	RCW 90.03.110(2)(b). In 2019, the Legislature directed Ecology to "assess and explore
26	opportunities to resolve water rights uncertainties and disputes through adjudications in selected

basins where tribal senior water rights, unquantified claims, and similar uncertainties about the 1 2 seniority, quantity and validity of water rights exist." E.S.H.B. 1109, § 302(6), 66th Leg., Reg. Sess. (2019). 3

In response, Ecology conducted a statewide assessment to identify and prioritize areas 4 where adjudication is needed to address pressing issues of demand on the water resource. 5 Ecology presented its Water Resources Adjudication Assessment to the Legislature in 6 September 2020. Dep't of Ecology, Water Resources Adjudication Assessment Report, 7 Publication 20-11-084 (Sept. 2020). In the assessment, Ecology found that it is in the public 8 interest to commence immediate adjudication of WRIA 1. In 2021, the Legislature funded 9 10 Ecology to prepare for the WRIA 1 adjudication including mapping, developing data systems, and outreach to impacted communities. In 2023, the Legislature funded Ecology to finalize 11 preparation for, and to file, this adjudication. 12

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B.

Necessity for WRIA 1 Adjudication

1. **Clarification and prioritization of Tribal rights and other federal claims**

Adjudication of WRIA 1 will respond to the petitions of the Lummi Nation and 15 Nooksack Tribe, identifying, prioritizing, and quantifying all federal and tribal rights in the 16 17 order of prior appropriation. The Tribes, both federally recognized Indian Tribes with reservations located within WRIA 1, petitioned Ecology to adjudicate their water rights. An 18 adjudication of their water rights would help in water resource management. Currently, the 19 Tribe's water rights are unquantified, which creates uncertainty and frustrates water resource 20 21 management.

The Nooksack River system supports diverse wildlife, including providing migration spawning, incubation, rearing, and foraging habitats for all nine native Pacific Northwest 23 salmonid species. These fish populations are in decline. See Carol J. Smith, Salmon and 24 Steelhead Habitat Limiting Factors in WRIA 1, the Nooksack Basin, Washington State 25 Conservation Commission (2002). Water for habitat is decreasing due to surface and ground 26

water consumption, land practices, and the snowpack and temperature impacts of climate
 change. Murphy, R. D. Modeling the Effects of Forecasted Climate Change and Glacier
 Recession on Late Summer Streamflow in the Upper Nooksack River Basin, Western
 Washington University (2016).

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2.

Clarification and prioritization of state surface and ground water uses, including permit exempt uses

Adjudication will also quantify and prioritize state rights to surface and ground water,
and ground users, and any others. This will include rights subject to the permitting
requirements, rights predating the water code and subject to the claims registry requirements,
and ground water uses exempt from permitting.

12 The users of water in WRIA 1 need affirmation of their water rights. An adjudication of surface and ground water rights addresses many challenges facing the region. The prior 13 appropriation doctrine is straightforward, but water management is not. An adjudication will 14 affirm water right claims filed under the Claim Registration Act, allowing Ecology to manage 15 water rights claims on a basis of priority and manage state issued water rights, including permit 16 17 exempt wells. Furthermore, the effects of climate change make the adjudication of water rights all the more important. Murphy, R. D., supra. Drought and other impacts to future water 18 availability will make prioritization of water rights critical to meet future water management 19 20 needs.

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C. Area Identified for Adjudication (Map)

Under RCW 90.03.110(1), Ecology is required to delineate the locality under investigation for adjudication. Ecology identifies WRIA 1 and includes two maps of this area as Exhibits A and Exhibit B to the Bedell declaration. Exhibit A is a full map of WRIA 1, the area to be adjudicated, and Exhibit B includes subbasins.

Water Resource Inventory Areas (WRIAs) are authorized under the Water Resources 1 2 Act of 1971, RCW 90.54 and established by rule under WAC 173-500-040. The state of Washington is divided into 62 WRIAs that are generally analogous in size with counties, but 3 have different boundaries. Ecology is authorized by law to develop and manage WRIAs. See 4 5 RCW 90.54.040. The waters within a WRIA, while proximate, are not necessarily in hydrologic continuity (connected waters) with each other. WRIA boundaries represent the administrative 6 underpinning of Ecology's business activities. Per WAC 173-500-060(2), "sufficient data are 7 obtained for each WRIA and/or grouping thereof in the state to enable the department to 8 formulate a water resource planning and management program for such area." The original 9 10 WRIA boundary agreements and judgments were reached jointly by Washington's natural resource agencies (Ecology, Natural Resources, Fish and Wildlife) in 1970. 11

WRIA 1 includes most of Whatcom County and parts of northern Skagit County. See 12 13 WAC 173-450-040. WRIA 1 is dominated by the Nooksack watershed, consisting of three forks (North, Middle, and South) that run from the Mount Baker area to the mainstem Nooksack 14 River, which enters Bellingham Bay. Bedell Decl. at 5. In addition to the Nooksack drainage, 15 WRIA 1 includes all areas of Whatcom County up to its northern border, which is the border of 16 the United States and Canada. Id. To the south, WRIA 1 includes certain areas of Skagit County 17 that are included in connected river system drainages. Id. It does not include the southernmost 18 areas of Whatcom County that are not connected to these drainages. Id. 19

In the interest of comprehensiveness, and in order to respond fully to the petitions of
Lummi Nation and Nooksack Tribe and resolve all associated reserved water right claims,
Ecology identifies the entirety of WRIA 1 for adjudication. This includes Point Roberts, along
with a number of islands not contiguous with the rest of the WRIA.

WRIA 1 is divided into ten subbasins that represent separate units within WRIA 1 based
on their geography. They are:

1 2 3 4 5	 South Fork of the Nooksack River and all tributaries thereto. Middle Fork of the Nooksack River and all tributaries thereto. North Fork of the Nooksack River and all tributaries thereto. Lower Nooksack River and all tributaries thereto. Sumas Subbasin and all tributaries thereto. Lake Whatcom Subbasin and all tributaries thereto. Coastal North Subbasin. Coastal South Subbasin. Coastal West Subbasin. Chilliwack River Basin and all tributaries thereto. 		
6 7	Ecology identifies these subbasins on the map attached to the Bedell Declaration as		
8	Exhibit B for reference. This is intended to orient the Court and parties to areas for reference as		
9	the adjudication proceeds.		
10	D. Requirement of Court Consultation		
11	As required by RCW 90.03.110(2)(a), Ecology has consulted with the Administrative		
12	Office of the Courts to determine whether sufficient judicial resources are available to commence		
13	and prosecute the adjudication in a timely manner. Ecology included court costs in its budget in		
14	2021 and 2023, and supported the court's request for additional judicial funding in 2024.		
15	E. Service of Summons		
16	Following this filing, Ecology expects this Court to order the service of a Summons with		
17	a return date:		
18	Upon the filing of the statement and map as provided in RCW 90.03.110 the		
19	judge of such superior court shall make an order directing summons to be issued, and fixing the return day thereof, which shall be not less than 100 nor		
20	more than 130 days, after the making of such order: PROVIDED, That for good		
21	cause, the court, at the request of the department, may modify said time period: PROVIDED FURTHER, That for an adjudication filed in water resource		
22	inventory area 1 after June 1, 2023, the return day for the latest time to file claims pursuant to such a summons shall be not less than one year after the		
23	making of such an order, unless special rules of procedure established by the court pursuant to RCW 90.03.160(3) provide for a later date.		
24	RCW 90.03.120(1) (emphasis added).		
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Upon the Court's order, Ecology will prepare to serve parties in accordance with the law,
and shall attach a claim form to the summons. Ecology intends to serve, via certified mail, a
summons on all parties described above and named in Exhibit C to the Bedell Declaration.
RCW 90.03.130(1). To the extent any party fails to sign a receipt for return of service, Ecology
will present their names to the Court with an affidavit in conformity with the statute relative to
service of summons by publication in civil actions.

Ecology intends to provide each party, along with the summons, copies of the form to
file claims for water, along with instructions and information on how to get assistance, as
required by RCW 90.03.140. Ecology has prepared a court claim form, in collaboration with the
Administrative Office of the Courts, which substantially includes the requirements listed in
RCW 90.03.140. Ecology will also have the claim form available online and by request through
phone, email, or in person at its Bellingham Field Office in order to best facilitate the filing of
claims.

Defendants must submit a claim form to participate in this action. Ecology, the parties,
or the Court may request additional information from defendants throughout the adjudication
process.

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V. PRAYER FOR RELIEF

Ecology respectfully requests the Court issue an order at the hearing set in the accompanying Notice of Hearing directing that a summons be issued out of this court in the name of the State of Washington, and fixing a return date of not less than one year from the making of the order. RCW 90.03.120(1). Ecology has provided a proposed order and summons with this Statement of Facts and Map. *See* Ex. 1 (Proposed Order Directing Summons and Proposed Summons).

Pursuant to RCW 90.03.120(2), the summons is to be issued by the clerk of this court and is to be to all known persons (as listed on Exhibit C) claiming a right to utilize the surface or ground water of WRIA 1 for any beneficial purpose, demanding that said person appear at

the time and place named in said order and assert such right; that the court cause said summons to be served in the matter provided by law; and that upon said hearing the court enter judgment adjudicating and determining the relative rights to the use of the waters of WRIA 1 for beneficial uses and determining the extent and priority of the rights of all persons claiming such right to use said waters.
