


Project Overview





City Center + Alderwood Plan

- Consultants: OTAK (with Leland and Fehr & Peers)
- Summary of Project: Establish a vision with a set of goals and policies for the PRSC-designated Lynnwood Regional Growth Center area.
- Project Includes:
 - NEW Subarea Plan (land use, housing, economic development, parks/open space, transportation)
 - SEPA Environmental Review with ElS and Planned Action Ordinance
 - Development Standards and Implementation
 - Recommendations
 - Coordination with Everett Link Extension (ST3)











Lynnwood Has Always Been at the Crossroads of Opportunity



Community Engagement



Early Engagement (September 2021 – March 2022)

 Purpose: Identify how the community wants to receive information and provide feedback on long range planning projects.

Methods:

- 451 Surveys (in person and online, English and Spanish)
- 9 Interviews to supplement responses (connect with immigrant/refugee and BIPOC trusted voices)


